


Since its premiere at the Sundance Film Festival and its national broadcasts on PBS' P.O.V. series, Logo/MTV, and public television's America ReFramed series, BROTHER OUTSIDER has introduced millions of viewers around the world to the life and work of Bayard Rustin — a visionary strategist and activist who has been called "the unknown hero" of the civil rights movement.

He was there at most of the important events of the Civil Rights Movement — but always in the background. Brother Outsider: The Life of Bayard Rustin asks "Why?" It presents a vivid drama, intermingling the personal and the political, about one of the most enigmatic figures in 20th-century American history. One of the first "freedom riders," an adviser to Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. and A. Philip Randolph, organizer of the march on Washington, intelligent, gregarious and charismatic, Bayard Rustin was denied his place in the limelight for one reason — he was gay.

We'll start promptly at 6:00 with a brief introduction, followed by the film. 83 minutes long.

Coincidentally, <u>Governor Gavin Newson has granted a posthumous pardon to Bayard Rustin.</u> When you see the film you'll understand why!



Poll Worker Information—Promote Democracy: Serve as a Poll Worker

Before each statewide election, thousands of Californians sign up to help put on the single most important event we hold in a democracy. County elections officials depend on reliable, dedicated teams of poll workers to make every Election Day run smoothly.

Who can be a poll worker?

To serve as a poll worker you must be:

A registered California voter or legal resident of the United States who would be eligible to vote except for your citizenship status:

An eligible high school student (/elections/voting-resources/voting-california/help-strengthen-ourdemocracy/poll-worker-info/#student)

What does a poll worker do?

Sets up and closes a polling place Helps voters understand their rights Protects ballots and voting equipment

Why be a poll worker?

Get involved and assist voters

Contribute to your community

Earn extra money (amount varies by county)

How do you apply?

Contact your **county elections official** (/elections/voting-resources/county-elections-offices/) for an application and answers to your questions about serving as a poll worker in your county. Organizations, businesses and government agencies can spread the word about becoming a poll worker by posting, emailing or handing out the **Secretary of State's poll worker recruitment flyer** (https://elections.cdn.sos.ca.gov/pdfs/student-pollworker-flyer.pdf).

High School Poll Workers

California Elections Code section 12302 allows eligible high school students to serve as poll workers on Election Day. Student poll workers learn firsthand how elections are run, and provide much needed support at polling place locations. They end their day with a better understanding of the importance of voting and the vital role poll workers play in making our elections run smoothly. County elections officials may assign up to five high school students to serve as poll workers in each election precinct. Students work under the direct supervision of appointed adult poll workers.

What does it take to be a high school poll worker?

serve as a high school poll worker, a student must:

Be a United States citizen

Be at least 16 years old on Election Day

Attend a public or private high school

Have at least a 2.5 grade point average

Get permission from your parents and school

Attend a training session

In addition to learning firsthand how elections are run, student poll workers can be paid a stipend that generally ranges between \$65 and \$150, depending on the county.

State Employees

Government Code section 19844.7, allows state employees to take paid time off to serve as poll workers on Election Day. Regulations: Employee shall be eligible for both regular state compensation and the fee paid by the Registrar of Voters. Eligibility of a state employee to serve at the polls is subject to approval by the employee's manager or supervisor. Employee seeking release time to work at the polls shall provide sufficient notice to allow the department to maintain adequate coverage and meet operational needs.

Verification of service as a poll worker on Election Day may be required by the appointing authority by requiring the employee to provide written verification of service from the Registrar of Voters, including the name of the employee serving and the date of the election.

Poll Worker Training Standards

Elections Code section 12309.5, requires the Secretary of State to adopt uniform poll worker training standards. These 2020 revised standards reflect lessons learned and changes in state law that have taken effect since the original standards were published in 2006.

After what seems like a very (very) long run-up to the 2020 election, it's almost time for California voters to cast our ballots in the presidential primary.

Primary Election Day is in 35 days on March 3rd. Some California voters who vote by mail have started to receive their ballots — most will begin receiving their ballots NEXT WEEK. In-person early voting also begins in county elections offices on February 3rd.

That means voting in California is imminent!

California voters have options when it comes to voting — all aimed at making the election more accessible and secure. But there are some important things to remember:


- When it comes to voting for president, your only options will be the candidates running in your political party. Registered Democrats, for example, will only see Democratic presidential candidates.
- The presidential primary rules uniquely affect No Party Preference (NPP) voters (now the second largest block of voters in California). NPP voters can request to vote for Democratic, American Independent, or Libertarian Party presidential candidates. Why only these parties? Because political parties decide if they will allow No Party Preference voters to vote in their presidential primary.
- No Party Preference voters received a postcard last month asking if they prefer to receive a vote-by-mail ballot with presidential candidates on it. If you're an NPP voter who missed this postcard, please reach out to your county elections office ASAP! You can still request your preferred ballot by phone, email, or fax. You can find county elections contact information at vote.ca.gov.
- And don't forget: you can change your party affiliation or update your voter registration anytime you want by re-registering to vote at registertovote.ca.gov.

Taking the time to make a plan to vote now will help ensure a smoother voting experience and will allow you to focus on your most important task of all, choosing who to vote.

To get started, verify your voter registration at voterstatus.sos.ca.gov and then visit HowToVoteFor-President.sos.ca.gov to make a plan to vote in the primary.

And we have a four-step plan to defeat them. We'll tell you a lot more about how we're going to accomplish all this in the coming weeks, but here's our strategy:

Build awareness and accountability. When senators take bad votes, we'll be in their states to broadcast it and hold them accountable for refusing to listen to constituents. And we'll keep reminding voters of their stances on the Affordable Care Act, abortion bans, climate change, and all our other top issues.

Boost local political power. We'll do the work to get as many people involved in the election as possible, growing our local groups and increasing logistical support for their election activities and recruitment efforts.

Organize to win. Our nationwide network will work directly with groups on the ground to leverage their power with voters, the candidates, and the media to build support for strong progressive challengers.
